Article 1. To choose by written ballot a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- A. One (1) Select Board member for a three (3)-year term.
- B. One (1) Director RSU#2 Board, for a three (3)-year term.
- C. Two (2) Cumston Library Trustees, each for a three (3)-year term.
- D. One (1) Sanitary District Trustee, for a three (3)-year term.

- b. To withhold employee contributions for employees who join under this provision on an after-tax basis and to remit them to MainePERS.

Explanation: State law and MEPERS Rules have changed to allow municipalities to opt in and allow municipal employees to join the MEPERS system up to 5-years after their initial employment date. This article, if approved, will allow Monmouth municipal employees to join the MEPERS system under these new rules. Currently, municipal employees can only join MEPERS when are initially employed by the town.
